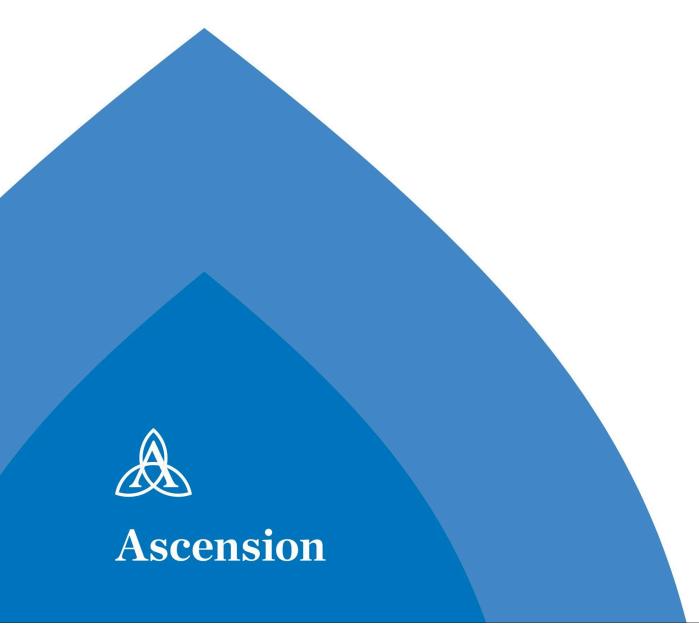

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Ascension St. Vincent Indianapolis



The purpose of this Implementation Strategy (IS) is to describe how the hospital plans to address prioritized health needs from its current Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA). The significant health needs the hospital does not intend to address are identified, and a rationale is provided. Special attention has been given to the needs of individuals and communities at increased risk for poor health outcomes or experiencing social factors that place them at risk.

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The Ascension St. Vincent Indianapolis Board of Directors approved the 2024 Implementation Strategy on October 21, 2025 (2024 tax year) and applies to the following three-year cycle: July 2025 to June 2028 (FY 2026 - FY 2028) . Ascension St. Vincent Indiana

Ascension St. Vincent operates 19 hospitals in addition to a comprehensive network of affiliated joint ventures, medical practices and clinics serving Indiana and employs more than 13,000 associates. In Fiscal Year 2024, Ascension St. Vincent provided more than \$357 million in community benefit and care of persons living in poverty throughout the state.

Ascension St. Vincent Indianapolis

As a Ministry of the Catholic Church, Ascension St. Vincent Indianapolis is a non-profit hospital governed by a local board of trustees represented by community members, medical staff, and sister sponsorships. Serving Indiana for over 145 years, Ascension St. Vincent Indianapolis is continuing the long and valued tradition of responding to the health needs of the people in Marion County, following in the footsteps of the Daughters of Charity who converted an unused seminary building, next to St. Joseph's Church on East Vermont Street in Indianapolis, into a hospital in 1881.

Ascension St. Vincent Indianapolis is a full-service, 840-bed, Level I trauma center with 24/7 emergency care. It is a destination for specialty care, including heart and vascular health, orthopedics, stroke care, cardiac rehabilitation, and critical care. The OB-GYN maternity care teams at the Ascension St. Vincent Women and Infants Hospital provide personalized birthing experiences. The hospital offers a wide range of minimally invasive procedures, imaging, lab tests, and rehabilitation services, all on one campus. It has dedicated resources to eight centers of excellence, including the Ascension St. Vincent Heart Center, Transplant Center, Comprehensive Stroke Center, Neuroscience Center, and Brain Tumor Center.

Overview of the Implementation Strategy

Needs Prioritization

Included in Code Section 501(r)(3) is the requirement that hospitals must provide a description of the process and criteria used to determine the most significant health needs of the community identified through the CHNA, along with a description of the process and criteria used to determine the prioritized needs to be addressed by the hospital. Accordingly, Ascension St. Vincent Indianapolis used a phased prioritization approach to identify the needs of Marion County. The first step was to determine the broader set of identified needs. The CHNA assessment narrowed identified needs to a group of significant needs determined most crucial for community stakeholders to address.

After completing the CHNA assessment, significant needs were further narrowed down to prioritized needs that the hospital will address within the IS. To arrive at the prioritized needs, Ascension St. Vincent Indianapolis used the following process: hospital leaders and board members reviewed the 2024 CHNA significant health needs and the data used to define each as significant, then voted on the top three needs they determined the hospital could respond to within its IS during the next three years. The criteria used to prioritize the significant needs were:

- Organizational capacity The hospital facility has the capacity to respond to the issue.
- Existing infrastructure The hospital facility has programs, systems, staff and support resources in place to respond to the issue.
- **Established relationships** There are established relationships with community partners to respond to the issue.
- Ongoing investment There are existing resources committed to the issue. Staff time and financial resources for this issue are counted as part of the community benefit effort.
- Focus area The hospital facility has acknowledged competencies and expertise to respond to the issue and the issue fits with the organizational mission.
- Magnitude of the problem The number of and/or disparities among people
- Severity of consequences The potential for mortality or morbidity
- Feasibility of intervention The available resources and evidence-based solutions
- Alignment with organizational or community goals The response would fit with strategic plans



Needs That Will Be Addressed

Following the completion of the current CHNA, Ascension St. Vincent Indianapolis has selected the prioritized needs outlined below for its 2024 IS. Ascension has defined "prioritized needs" as the significant needs that the hospital has prioritized to address through the three-year CHNA cycle:

- Access to Care –This need was selected because access to care indicators such as adults
 reporting fair or poor health, low birthweight babies, per capita supply of healthcare providers,
 preventable hospital stays, and/or core preventive services compared unfavorably to peer
 counties or U.S. averages and because community meeting participants identified access to
 care (including preventive services) as a priority.
- Behavioral Health (includes Mental Health and Access to Mental Health Services and Substance Use Disorders, including Nicotine, and Suicide) This need was selected because mental health indicators such as number of poor mental health days, number of mental health providers per population, depression rate and/or suicide rate compared unfavorably to peer counties or U.S. averages and because community meeting participants identified mental health as a priority. Substance use disorder is included because indicators such as drug poisoning deaths, percentage of tobacco and/or e-cigarette users, opioid-related deaths, and/or the percentage of alcohol-impaired driving deaths compared unfavorably to peer counties or U.S. averages and because community meeting participants stressed the prevalence of SUD and mental health as co-occurring health issues and identified them as priorities.
- Maternal, Infant, Child Health This need was selected because the following indicators
 compare unfavorably to state and/or national benchmarks: infant mortality, low birth weight,
 percentage of residents under 18 living in poverty, and the percentage of children living in single
 parent households. Community input stressed that challenges to healthy outcomes are
 exacerbated by substance misuse within the family and the lack of health literacy, affordable
 childcare and providers contribute to this health issue.

Ascension St. Vincent Indianapolis understands the importance of all the community's health needs. It is committed to playing an active role in improving the health of the people in the communities it serves. For this implementation strategy, Ascension St. Vincent Indianapolis has focused its efforts on the above priorities.



Needs That Will Not Be Addressed

Based on the prioritization criteria, the health needs identified through the CHNA that Ascension St. Vincent Indianapolis does not plan to address within the hospital's IS at this time include:

- Communicable Diseases/Sexually Transmitted Infections The hospital, together with AMG, provides diagnoses, treatments, and counseling for community members with communicable diseases and STIs. Additionally, the hospital remains committed to partnering with community groups to address this identified health need and will continue to seek opportunities to do so. As federal, state, and local authorities, as well as community-based organizations, are working to reduce communicable diseases/STIs, the hospital will not directly address this need in the current Implementation Strategy.
- Food Security The hospital works to improve food security of community members through a variety of means, such as continuation of partnerships with schools to support supplemental feeding programs, financial donations to charitable organizations, and/or food drives. Moreover, the hospital, together with AMG, screens patients for food insecurity and provides referrals to community resources and/or hospital-based local resources. Additionally, the hospital remains committed to partnering with community groups to address this identified health need and will continue to seek opportunities to do so. As federal, state, and local authorities, as well as community-based organizations, are working to improve food security, the hospital will not directly address this need in the current Implementation Strategy.
- Obesity, Physical Inactivity, and Associated Chronic Disease The hospital, together with AMG, provides education on various health topics related to obesity, physical inactivity, and associated chronic disease through health fairs and screenings, health education, wellness programs, lectures, school health education programs, and/or community support groups. Additionally, the hospital remains committed to partnering with community groups to address these identified health needs and will continue to seek opportunities to do so. As federal, state, and local authorities, as well as community-based organizations, are working to reduce this need, the hospital will not directly address this need in their current Implementation Strategy.
- Racial and Ethnic Health Disparities The hospital is a ministry of Ascension St. Vincent, which is committed to serving all individuals, with special attention to those living in poverty and who are most vulnerable. The hospital remains committed to partnering with community groups to address the issue of health disparities and will continue to seek opportunities to do so. As federal, state, and local authorities, as well as community-based organizations, are working to reduce this need, the hospital will not directly address this need in the current Implementation Strategy.



- Social Drivers of Health (including Poverty, Affordable Housing, Food Insecurity, and Transportation) The hospital, together with AMG, screens patients for needs related to social determinants of health. Moreover, supporting services and referrals are provided by Community Health Workers in the Ascension St. Vincent Health Access Department, to meet needs, such as transportation and housing. Additionally, the hospital remains committed to partnering with community groups to address needs related social determinants of health and will continue to seek opportunities to do so. As federal, state, and local authorities, as well as community-based organizations, are working to reduce this need, the hospital will not directly address this need in the current Implementation Strategy.
- Violence and Crime- The hospital, together with AMG, screens patients to identify safety concerns as well as for social determinants of health factors related to violence and crime. Moreover, supporting services and referrals are provided by Community Health Workers in the Ascension St. Vincent Health Access Department, to respond to violence and crime encountered by patients. The hospital remains committed to partnering with community groups to address these identified health needs and will continue to seek opportunities to do so. As federal, state, and local authorities, as well as community-based organizations, are working to reduce violence and crime, the hospital will not directly address this need in the current Implementation Strategy

While these needs are not the focus of this Implementation Strategy, Ascension St. Vincent Indianapolis may consider investing resources in these areas as appropriate, depending on opportunities to leverage organizational assets in partnership with local communities and organizations. Also, this report only encompasses a partial inventory of everything Ascension Ascension St. Vincent Indianapolis does to support health within the community.

Approval and Adoption of the IS by Ascension St. Vincent Indianapolis

To ensure the Ascension St. Vincent Indianapolis's efforts meet the needs of the community and have a lasting and meaningful impact, the 2024 Implementation Strategy was presented and adopted by the Ascension St. Vincent Indianapolis Board of Directors on October 21, 2025. Although an authorized body of the hospital must adopt the IS to be compliant with the provisions of the Affordable Care Act, adoption of the IS also demonstrates that the board is aware of the IS, endorses the priorities identified, and supports the action plans that have been developed to address prioritized needs.

- 2. By June 30, 2028, Ascension St. Vincent Indianapolis will increase the 3-year total number of individuals established with a medical home through the completion of a Medical Home Pathway by 3% compared to the total established in FY2023-FY2025.

Objective

By June 30, 2028, Peyton Manning Children's Hospital at St. Vincent will increase the number of injury prevention educational outreach events, focused on the topics of button battery, scald burns, safe sleep, and car seat safety, by 3% from the baseline established in FY26.

Strategy

Educate and equip parents and caregivers with information and supplies to prevent child injuries.
