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Introduction

As one of the leading non-profit and Catholic health systems in the United States, Ascension is committed to delivering compassionate, personalized care to all, with special attention to persons living in poverty and those most vulnerable.

As a Ministry of the Catholic Church, Ascension Via Christi Hospital Pittsburg, Inc. (AVCH-P) is a non-profit hospital governed by a local board of trustees represented by residents, medical staff, and sister sponsorship's, and has been providing medical care to Crawford County and surrounding areas. Serving southeastern Kansas since 1903, AVCH-P is continuing the long and valued tradition of addressing the health of the people in our community, following in the legacy footsteps of the Sisters of St. Joseph. AVCH-P operates one hospital campus in Pittsburg, Kansas, an emergency department in Fort Scott, Kansas, more than nine related healthcare facilities, and employs more than 18 physicians, 11 mid-level healthcare professionals, six certified registered nurse anesthetists, and five contracted providers.

Overview of the Implementation Strategy

Purpose

This implementation strategy (IS) is the hospital's response to the health needs prioritized from its current Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA). It describes the actions the hospital will take to address prioritized needs, allocate resources, and mobilize hospital programs and community partners to work together. This approach aligns with AVCH-P's commitment to offer programs designed to address the health needs of the community, with special attention to persons who are underserved and vulnerable.

IRS 501(r)(3) and Form 990, Schedule H Compliance

The CHNA and IS satisfy certain requirements of tax reporting, pursuant to provisions of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010, more commonly known as the Affordable Care Act (ACA). As part of the ACA, all non-profit hospitals are required to conduct a CHNA and adopt an implementation strategy every three years. Requirements for 501(c)(3) Hospitals Under the Affordable Care Act are described in Code Section 501(r)(3), and include making the CHNA report (current and previous) widely available to the public. Process to Prioritize Needs

Included in Code Section 501(r)(3) is the requirement that hospitals must provide a description of the process and criteria used to determine the most significant health needs of the community identified through the CHNA, along with a description of the process and criteria used to determine the prioritized needs to be addressed by the hospital. Accordingly, AVCH-P used a phased prioritization approach to identify the needs for Crawford County. The first step was to determine the broader set of identified needs through key informant interviews and secondary data analysis. Through the CHNA assessment, identified needs were then narrowed to a set of significant needs which were determined most crucial for community stakeholders to address. The significant needs for Crawford County included: Access to Care, Housing and Transportation, Alcohol and Drug Use, Food Insecurity, Health Equity, and Diet and Exercise.

Following the completion of the CHNA assessment, significant needs were further narrowed down to a set of prioritized needs that the hospital will address within the implementation strategy. The criteria used to prioritize the significant needs were:

- Alignment with organizational strengths and priorities
- Ability to leverage organizational resources and assets
- Existing community resources and partnerships to address the problem
- Feasibility of change and availability of tested approaches

Needs That Will Be Addressed

Based on the prioritization criteria, AVCH-P leadership has selected the prioritized needs outlined below for its 2022 Implementation Strategy. Ascension has defined "prioritized needs" as the significant needs which have been prioritized by the hospital to address through the three-year CHNA implementation strategy:

- Access to Care This need includes access to general health care services as well as mental health and substance abuse services. This need was selected because it aligns with the organizational mission, strengths, and priorities. AVCH-P is able to leverage organizational resources and partnerships to address access to care within the Crawford County community.
- Transportation This need was selected because transportation services is a need AVCH-P is already addressing. AVCH-P has the resources and capacity to provide transportation and develop community partnerships to transport individuals to/from health care appointments and services.
- Food Insecurity This need was selected because AVCH-P can leverage organizational resources and partnerships to provide food to those in need.

AVCH-P understands the importance of all the health needs of the community and is committed to playing an active role in improving the health of the people in the communities it serves. For the



purposes of this implementation strategy, AVCH-P has chosen to focus its efforts on the priorities listed above.

Needs That Will Not Be Addressed

Based on the prioritization criteria, the significant needs that AVCH-P does not plan to address at this time include:

- Housing AVCH-P does not specialize nor has the resources to address the multi-factorial housing issues. AVCH-P executives do participate in many community coalitions and boards to address the social determinant of health such as housing issues within the community, and will continue to look for opportunities to partner to address the most pressing needs within the community.
- Alcohol and Drug Use This need was not selected because there is an overall shortage of substance abuse services in the community. AVCH-P does not have the capacity or resources to provide comprehensive substance abuse programs. AVCH-P will continue to work with local organizations to improve interagency coordination and develop a plan to increase mental health and substance abuse services in the community.
- Health Equity This need was not selected since health equity is a part of a deeper systemic issue that AVCH-P does not have the expertise or resources to address within the broader community. Others in the community have the intellectual and resource capabilities to address health equity within the broader community. However, the health system is committed to train associates to provide culturally competent care and will continue to look at opportunities to develop strategic partnerships to eliminate barriers for community members to live long, healthy lives.
- Diet and Exercise Although AVCH-P provides diet and exercise programs to patients based on diagnosis and treatment plans, AVCH-P does not have programs for the broader community. Many other community organizations, public health departments, and health centers provide programs (e.g., Diabetes Prevention Program) for the general community.

While these needs are not the focus of this implementation strategy, AVCH-P may consider investing resources in these areas as appropriate, depending on opportunities to leverage organizational assets in partnership with local communities and organizations. Also, this report does not encompass a complete inventory of everything AVCH-P does to support health within the community.

Acute Community Concern Acknowledgement

The CHNA and Implementation Strategies (IS) offer a construct for identifying and addressing needs within the community(s) it serves. However, unforeseen events or situations, which may be severe and sudden, may affect a community. At Ascension, this is referred to as an acute community concern. This



could describe anything from a health crisis (e.g., COVID-19), water poisoning, environmental events (e.g., hurricane, flood) or other event that suddenly impacts a community. In which case, if adjustments to an IS are necessary, the hospital will develop documentation in the form of a SBAR (Situation-Background-Assessment-Response) to notify key internal and external stakeholders of those possible adjustments.

Approval and Adoption by Ascension Via Christi Hospital Pittsburg, Inc. Board of Directors

To ensure the AVCH-P's efforts meet the needs of the community and have a lasting and meaningful impact, the 2022 Implementation Strategy was presented and adopted by Ascension Via Christi Hospital Pittsburg, Inc's Board of Directors on September 8, 2022. Although an authorized body of the hospital must adopt the IS to be compliant with the provisions in the Affordable Care Act, adoption of the IS also demonstrates that the board is aware of the IS, endorses the priorities identified, and supports the action plans that have been developed to address prioritized needs.



Action Plans

The IS below is based on prioritized needs from the hospital's most recent CHNA. These strategies and action plans represent where the hospital will focus its community efforts over the next three years. While these remain a priority, the hospital will continue to offer additional programs and services to meet the needs of the community, with special attention to those who are poor and vulnerable.

Prioritized Need: Access to Care

Goal 1 - Access to Health Care Services: Improve access to high quality and affordable healthcare for underserved communities.

Strategy 1: Advocate for policies that will improve health outcomes and access to health care.

Hospitals: AVCH-P

Objective: Develop an annual policy agenda to support bills that further improve access to health care and health outcomes.

Target Population:

- Low-income
- Children, pregnant women, and elderly
- People with disabilities
- Underinsured and uninsured

Collaboration:

• Other Ascension hospitals: AVCH-W

Resources:

• Ascension hospitals: people, advocacy

Actions:

- Develop an annual policy agenda that supports increased access to medical insurance and health care (e.g., Medicaid expansion, increasing the healthcare workforce, and funding for mental health services), reduces barriers to access health care, improves health equity, and addresses the social determinants of health (e.g., economic development, food security, fair housing and rental practices)
- Track bills related to AVC's policy agenda
- Visit with elected legislators at local and state levels
- Advocate for bills, resources, and funding that align with the policy agenda

Outcome/Output:

• Types of bills tracked and supported (e.g., Medicaid expansion) and opposed (e.g., decrease access to needed services)



- # bills tracked
- # bills supported/opposed

Anticipated Impact: Improve access to insurance and health care services, utilization of health services, and the affordability of care.

Strategy 2: Assist eligible patients and their dependents with applications for public insurance programs.

Hospitals: AVCH-P

Objective: Assist qualifying uninsured and underinsured individuals and their dependents enroll in public programs.

Target Population:

- Low-income adults, children, pregnant women, and elderly
- People with disabilities
- Underinsured and uninsured

Collaboration:

Collaborators: R1 Financial Counselors, Community Health Center of Southeast Kansas (CHC SEK)

Resources:

- Ascension hospitals: social workers and other patient navigators to screen patients and provide referrals to R1, financial assistance
- Collaborators: Financial Counselors, assistance with applications and eligibility, sliding scale services, financial assistance

Actions:

- Financial counselors, social workers, and other patient navigators will assess patients for eligibility
- Educate individuals about public program (e.g., Medicaid, disability) options and eligibility
- Provide referrals to Early Detection Works and hospital financial assistance program
- Assist with application submission and verify eligibility to complete the enrollment process
- Develop, test, and launch interface with CHC SEK to develop a shared financial assistance application to facilitate and improve admissions and scheduling between the organizations

Outcome/Output:

- # of enrollments per public benefit
- Status of shared financial assistance application interface with FQHC



Anticipated Impact: Increase utilization of preventative care, improve accessibility of care, and provide affordable insurance options to individuals and their dependents.

Strategy 3: Provide free or low-cost prescriptions for qualifying underinsured and uninsured individuals.

Hospitals: AVCH-P

Objective: Improve access to free prescriptions by June 30, 2025.

Target Population:

- Low-income
- Underinsured and uninsured

Collaboration:

• Other Ascension hospitals: AVCH-W

Resources:

• Ascension Hospitals: Dispensing sites, pharmacy associates, funding, IT infrastructure

Actions:

- Conduct initial application interview with the patient to determine eligibility
- Coordinate with manufacturers Patient Assistance Programs or others to obtain free or reduced medications
- Provide free or discounted medications and testing supplies to qualifying uninsured and underinsured individuals
- Explore options and feasibility of becoming a Dispensary of Hope outpatient pharmacy

Outcome/Output:

- # persons provided free or reduced cost medications
- # of prescriptions

Anticipated Impact: Increase access to preventative and maintenance medications to people who otherwise may not be able to afford their medication.

Strategy 4: Continue to provide emergency services through the Fort Scott Emergency Department.

Hospitals: AVCH-P

Objective: Continue to operate the Fort Scott ED at the request of the Bourbon County leaders.

Target Population:

• Rural communities



Collaboration:

Collaborators: Bourbon County commision

Resources:

• Ascension Hospital: Emergency Department, infrastructure, staff, services

Actions:

- At the request of Bourbon County leaders, maintain the ED in Ft Scott, Kansas until February 2023
- Provide emergency services, diagnostic imaging, and laboratory services
- Assess the need for additional services for the community
- Assess viability of supporting the ED and expanding clinical services past the February 2023 agreement

Outcome/Output:

• Cost of subsidized services

Anticipated Impact: Increase access to Emergency Department services for rural populations who may not be able to access timely emergency services otherwise.

Goal 2 - Access to Mental Health Services: Improve access to high quality and affordable mental and behavioral health care and supportive services.

Strategy: Establish a community coalition to improve access to mental health and substance abuse services.

Hospitals: AVCH-P

Objective: Increase coordination and collaboration among area agencies by developing a community action plan to improve access to mental and behavioral health services by June 30, 2025.

Target Population: Persons in need of mental and behavioral services

Collaboration:

• Collaborators: Crawford County Mental Health, CHC SEK, City of Pittsburg, police department, Pittsburg State University

Resources:

- Ascension hospital: people
- Collaborators: people, funding, services



Actions:

- Identify key community stakeholders
- Develop and actively participate on boards and committees to improve coordination of mental and behavioral health services
- Develop action plan with key stakeholders
- Advocate for funds and policies when applicable

Outcome/Output:

- Collaboration and advocacy activities
- # hours spent working to develop partnerships and coordinate services with area agencies (e.g., time spent on boards, committees, advocating)

Anticipated Impact: Increase coordination among providers to improve the continuum of care for community members. Increase access to mental and behavioral health services, social services, and substance abuse programs.

Prioritized Need: Transportation

Goal 3: Improve health outcomes by addressing social determinants of health barriers related to transportation.

Strategy: Provide CareVan transportation for individuals who are otherwise unable to get to health care appointments.

Hospitals: AVCH-P

Objective: Improve coordination and collaboration of transportation services between area health care and social service agencies.

Target Population:

- People with disabilities
- Homeless
- Persons without transportation methods or unable to drive

Collaboration:

 Collaborators: Ft Scott E.D., CHC SEK, area hospitals and clinics, and other health care providers

Resources:

- Ascension hospitals: people to provide communication/coordination, transportation services
- Collaborators: people to provide communication/coordination, transportation services



Actions:

- Work with area hospitals, clinics, nonprofit organizations, and community partners to improve collaboration and coordination between organizations
- Screen patients for transportation barriers and refer to hospital CareVan transportation services
- Provide transportation for eligible patients to area health care appointments
- Collaborate with CHC-SEK to explore options to launch a centralized dispatch for medical transportation services

Outcome/Output:

- # of transports provided
- Status on centralized dispatch for transportation services

Anticipated Impact: Reduce transportation barriers to obtaining timely care.

Prioritized Need: Food Insecurity

Goal 5: Improve access to healthy and affordable food options.

Strategy 1: Support area agencies addressing food insecurity through in-kind donations of food, cash, or volunteer hours.

Hospitals: AVCH-P

Objective: Increase access to food for those in need.

Target Population:

- Low-income
- Home-bound
- Homeless

Collaboration:

 Collaborations: Area agencies providing food banks and kitchens (e.g., The Lord's Diner, Meals on Wheels)

Resources:

- Ascension hospital: volunteers, in-kind donations of food and/or cash
- Collaborators: people, distribution networks, facilities, outreach

Actions:

- Identify area agencies that provide food to those in need
- Provide in-kind donations of food, cash, and/or staff volunteers



- Promote volunteer opportunities and food drives
- Provide a drop-off box for community donations
- Staff volunteers will adopt Meals on Wheels routes

Outcome/Output:

- # volunteer hours
- Dollar amount of cash donated

Anticipated Impact: Reduce barriers for community members who may have difficulty accessing food.

Strategy 2: Connect patients to area agencies that assist with social needs (e.g., rent/utilities assistance, food assistance programs, housing).

Hospitals: AVCH-P

Objective: Decrease barriers to accessing food programs for qualifying community members by June 30, 2025.

Target Population:

- Low-income
- Underinsured and uninsured
- Persons in need of non-medical assistance (e.g., food, shelter, utility assistance)

Collaboration:

• Collaborators: Find Help

Resources:

- Ascension hospital: screening, people, referral systems, community connections
- Collaborators: Neighborhood Resource platform

Actions:

- Screen patients for non-medical and social needs (i.e., social determinants of health)
- Refer patients to food assistance programs, food banks, and kitchens
- Refer patients to other needs such as housing, utilities and rent assistance
- Follow-up to ensure referral and follow-up occurred

Outcome/Output:

- # referrals to public programs (e.g., WIC, SNAP, housing, rental and utility assistance)
- # referrals to food assistance programs
- # referrals to food banks, kitchens, and other organizations that provide food



Anticipated Impact: Reduce barriers for community members who may have difficulty accessing food.

Evaluation

AVCH-P will develop a comprehensive measurement and evaluation process for the IS. AVCH-P will monitor and evaluate the action plans outlined for the purpose of reporting and documenting the impact these action plans have on the community. AVCH-P uses a tracking system to capture community benefit activities and implementation. To ensure accountability, data will be aggregated into an annual Community Benefit report that will be made available to the community.
